Metaphysics Syllabus

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Course Description

This course explores some of the main themes in metaphysics. After a brief introduction to the discipline, we will discuss topics such as: personal identity (what are we?), free will, death, God, and the nature of time.

No textbook is required: the readings are available either through UM library or through external links.

Goals

By the end of the class the student will be able to: Understand what metaphysicians are interested in and how they explore their areas of interest. Think about issues in metaphysics in a knowledgeable way. Write clearly about the topics covered in the class.

Requirements and grading

Every assignment will be graded, apart from the first assignment (the introduction videos). Every assignment will be worth 10 points. Apart from the short assignments throughout the course, there will also be two exams: a midterm and a final, as well as a paper *that will be revised once*.
